## Tobacco Forms Major Revenue For 300,000

ATLANTA, July 9 — (AP) — Some curls from curing barns in the southeast's tobacco land, starting another luxury crop of cigaret leaf toward markets.

Upwards of 300,000 southern farmers look to flue-cured tobacco, the type used principally for cigarets and snuff, for a major part of their annual income.

They set out plants this year under controls intended to restrict production to less than 700,000,000 pounds, for a nation that consumes between 350,000,000 and 400,000,000 pounds annually. The remainder was aimed at the export trade, dwindled now a mere trickle because of the loss of European and
