

Former AEF Chief Of Staff Will Deliver Defense Talk

Gen. James G. Harbord Will Direct Remarks To
Second Division-assn Reunion In
St. Louis

"National Defense" will be discussed by Gen. James G. Harbord, chairman of the board of the Radio Corporation of America, in an address to the annual reunion of the Second Division-assn of the American Expeditionary Force, which also is to be broadcast over WEAFF Saturday from 9:30 to 9:45 p. m.

General Harbord, who was chief of staff for the Second Division during the World War, will speak from New York to former soldiers attending the reunion at the Hotel Statler in St. Louis.

Banjoist Eddie Peabody, Florence Folsom, Denny Duncan, Glenn Welty's orchestra and Joe Kelly, m.c., also will be heard.
