Famous Actor Will Do "This Is Our Side Of The
Ocean" During Broadcast At
7 P. M.

Frank Black, general music director of NBC, has made a special arrangement of "This Is Our Side of the Ocean" by George M. Cohan, the most prolific writer of patriotic songs the country has known and the grand old man of the theatre, who will introduce it to radio himself when he guest stars on Black's Friday night concert program over the Red network at 7 p. m.

Regular vocalists are Lucille Manners and Ross Graham.
