Burns Returns To Crosby Spot Along With Noted Guests; Famous Head Hunter To Tell His Story

The world's only white man to become king of the head hunters, Gen. T. Q. Ashburn, won his blood-curdling title while serving with the U. S. Army in the Philippine Islands in 1899. Now retired, General Ashburn will appear on the Strange As It Seems program, Thursday, 7:30 p. m., over WABC. His amazing exploits will be related in an interview with Alois Havrilla, master-of-ceremonies.

Romantic Hawaii will be the setting for the Rudy Vallee program on Thursday, when that famous ruler of the islands, King Kamehameha, serves as a script writers' outrigger for Vallee during the broadcast at 9 p. m., over WEAf.

Guests will include that perpetually astonished comedian of the films, Edward Everett Horton, the lovely singing star, Harriet Hilliard, and not in a grass kilt, Slapsie Maxie Rosenbloom. Assisting also will be that well-known maestro of the Atolls, Ray Kinney.
