Ellery Queen turns what might have been a testful two weeks in the jury box into a bus-man's holiday when he reveals the rightful killer thru four questions asked of the coroner in "The Adventure of the Meanest Man in the World" over WABC Sunday, at 6:30 p. m. Walter Wanger, the movie producer, will act as an armchair detective.

MERCER-CO FAIR COMES TO CLOSE

Officials Report Attendance Near Record For Six-Day Program

CELINA, Aug. 17—One of the greatest fairs ever staged here in Mercer-co, closed Friday evening after a six-day run which opened Sunday afternoon.

Favored by clear skies, attendance was high every day, with Thursday's crowd being one of the largest in the history of the fair. Only six seats remained unoccupied in the grandstand Thursday, while race fans followed the trotters and pacers in fast heats.

The night fair was well attended with capacity crowds on hand for the Boone County Jamboree and Renfro Valley Barn dance.

The livestock exhibits, largest in many a year, overflowed all the barn space and many of the animals were exhibited from tents, which were erected to take care of the heavy entry lists.

Members of the four county granges participated in the exhibits in the agriculture hall, with the Unity Grange of Washington-tp winning the ribbon with its patriotic display on the theme, "God Bless America."
