6:30 p. m., WJSV—Maj. George Fielding Eliot of "The Ramparts We Watch" fame, circles in a plane above No Man's Land of upper New York State, where 100,000 troops are beginning a four-day campaign.

7, WJSV—Edward J. Flynn, new chairman of the Democratic National Committee who is directing President Roosevelt's campaign for reelection, makes his first radio "Address to Democratic Workers." Will he say anything about those campaign books?

7:30, WMAL—Pertinax, leading French journalist who escaped Paris when the Petain government capitulated, is interviewed by Pearson and Allen on their radio Merry-Go-Round.
