

# Summertime Favorites To Be Featured On Spitalny Hour

All-Girl Orchestra Will Play Popular Numbers; Jessica Dragonette And James Newill Will Be Heard From Detroit At 8 P. M. Sunday

Summertime favorites will be the theme when Phil Spitalny assembles his attractive all-girl orchestra for the "Hour of Charm" program Sunday evening at 9 o'clock over WLW.

The orchestra will feature "I'll Never Smile Again," "Latin's Knew How," and "Too Romantic," while the all-girl choir with Maxine and the Three Little Words sing "Trade Winds."

Evelyn and her violin will hold the spotlight with "The Breeze and I," and the "Three Little Words" will follow with their own arrangement of "The Gaucho's Serenade."

The solo spot for Vivien and her lovely voice will be "In the Gloaming" during which the orchestra's newest feature will have the accompaniment of the String Choir. Violins and voices blend for the hymn of the evening, "Somebody."

The orchestra under Leith Stevens will vie for major attention with Jessica Dragonette and James Newill, singing stars, on the Summer Hour broadcast Sunday, heard from 8 to 9 over WJR.

Besides treating such popular tunes as "The Breeze And I" and "Where Do I Go From You?" to symphonic performance, Stevens will present a Hollywood medley of movie musical hits, among them "Flying Down to Rio," "Over the Rainbow," and "Beyond the Blue Horizon."

Stevens will call upon the orchestra for its best in a performance of "My Songs," a tune written by Leith himself. The orchestra will also present new and old versions of "Lazy Mary."

Newill is to sing two long-popular melodies—"Softly as in the Morning Sunrise," and the vigorous "Largo El Factotum." Miss Dragonette will be heard in "Love is the Sun," from "Three Musketeers," and "Irish Love Song." The two will also take part in songs featuring "South Sea Cruise," a words-and-music version of a tourists' bureau.

John Gunther will pinch-hit as the last of a series of guest speak-

ers in the Walter Winchell period over WLW Sunday at 8 p. m. Gunther has served as foreign correspondent in all the principal capitals of Europe and has covered, among other things, the French war in Syria, the Palestine riots, the evacuation of the Rhineland, the Sino Japanese break at Geneva and the Spanish revolution. Until recently he was commentator in his own series of broadcasts. Winchell will be back Sept. 1.

Ted Weems and the orchestra open the "Beat the Band" program Sunday at 5:20 p. m., over WLW with the novelty "Dixie Roadside Stand." Perry Como sings "Love Lies," Elmo Tanner whistles "Mr. Meadowlark," and the band closes with "Wonderful One, Let's Dance." Garry Moore emcees the music-quiz and Fort Pearson announces.
