Like all kids, Baby Dumpling is crazy about frogs, turtles, and other fauna. De Quincey first attracted attention when, as a youth, he antedated Tarzan by running wild thru the hills of Wales for a year. During this period he almost starved and contracted a raging rheumatic headache which never left him, and which drove him to drug addiction for relief.

Despite this vice, against which he fought with varying success, de Quincey became one of England's greatest critics, humorists and essayists.
