

Janet Fox Gets First Lead In "Manhattan At Midnight"

President Roosevelt To Be Heard During Address Before Teamsters' Union In Washington

Janet Fox, popular character actress, will play her first romantic lead in "Manhattan At Midnight," on Wednesday, at 7:30 p. m. over WJZ. She will be supported by a pair of microphone veterans, Ed Jerome and Bill Johnstone.

Miss Fox, who is the niece of Edna Ferber, will play the role of "Gail Martin" in Theodore and Mathilde Ferro's story of marriage doomed to destruction by a young couple who have allowed careers to come first in their interests. When a young magazine editor and his costume designer wife decide to keep working after their marriage in order to save for the future, they do not suspect that it will jeopardize having a future together at all. A trip to Reno points the way to an unexpected happiness in a surprise climax to the drama.

President Roosevelt will be heard over WJZ on Wednesday, Sept. 11, from 9 to 10 p. m., when he addresses a meeting of the International Federation of Teamsters and Chauffeurs in Constitution Hall, Washington, D. C.

The President will be introduced by Daniel J. Tobin, head of the union, which is one of the central units of the American Federation of Labor.

Frances Langford will introduce "You're Nearer" from her latest picture, "Too Many Girls," on the Star theatre program, Wednesday, 8:00 p. m. over WABC. Frances will also sing "Song of Old Hawaii," Kenny Baker will sing "September In The Rain" and "Cynthia." David Broekman's orchestra will play "Bye, Bye Blues" and "Little Boy Blue" from the leader's "Manhattan Fairy Tale Suite."

Special emphasis will be placed on the "Mr. District Attorney" program over WEAF Wednesday at 8:30 p. m., when several film scouts will be numbered in the air audience. There is vigorous bidding to buy screen rights for the popular radio series.

The series stars Jay Jostyn in the title role, is dedicated to exposing rackets, written by Finis Farr, directed by Ed Byron, and features Vicki Vola and Len Doyle, recruited from Broadway stages, in supporting roles. Mood music is under the baton of Peter Van Steeden. There's a possibility that several members of the radio cast will be in the picture version if kilocycle commitments permit.
