DISCUSSION OF UNIONIZATION PLAN PLEDGED

LONDON, Sept. 19 — (UP) — Prime Minister Winston Churchill is prepared to give full opportunity for discussion of any far-reaching scheme for union between Great Britain and the United States, the house of commons was told today.

There was no indication in the commons discussion, however, that any such scheme had been put forward.

The promise of full discussion if such a plan is advanced was given to commons by Major Clement R. Attlee.

Attlee told a questioner that Churchill is prepared to give assurance that if any plan for union between Britain and the United States—such as was proposed between Britain and France—is put forward, the government will give commons full opportunity to discuss it.
