9:30 A. M. **WMAL**—Sir William J. Coxen, Lord Mayor of London, addresses the United States Conference of Mayors convening at New York's Waldorf.

11. **WJSV**—Secretary of Agriculture Claude E. Wickard makes one of his first addresses since assuming office when he greets America's farmers on Columbia's Country Journal.

2:30 p. m. **WJSV**—Republican Vice Presidential candidate Senator Charles L. McNary starts his campaign.

3:30. **WMAL**—Running of the Beldame Handicap for fillies and mares at Long Island's Aqueduct.

3. **WRC**—The Budapest String Quartet plays three quartets at the Library of Congress: Haydn in G major, Op. 76, No. 1; Mendelssohn in E flat, Op. 12; Beethoven in E minor, Op. 59, No. 2.

5:30. **WJSV**—"London Carries On!" Columbia's staff in the British capital explores the streets, the air-raid shelters and the crypt of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields in a special half-hour similar to a thrilling one of three weeks ago.

10:45. **WOL**—Coaches Bill Reinhart, of George Washington University and Jack Hagerty, of Georgetown express no doubt for their teams' futures during the coming grid season.
