

Edward Arnold To Star In Short Play For Kate Smith

"The Lady And The Gardenia" Will Be Offering; Man Who Has God For Partner In Business To Be On Ripley Hour

Kate Smith will present Edward Arnold, veteran screen star, in "The Lady and the Gardenia," an original one-act play by Jean Holloway, on the second program of the new Kate Smith series over WABC Friday at 7 p. m.

The play finds Arnold in the role of a great theatrical producer who is attracted by the personality of a street waif.

"God's partner" will be Robert Ripley's guest in the "Believe It Or Not" broadcast on WABC at 9 p. m. The man who claims this title (without any intent at irreverence) is Robert Gilmour Le-Tourneau, manufacturer of road building equipment.

Le Tourneau had very bad luck with a number of business ventures up to 1929 when he decided that he would make God a partner in his business—would share with the Lord in all profits. Since then he has had phenomenal success and, true to his word, has turned over much time, energy and money to religious works. Among other things, he is president of a \$12,000,000 evangelical foundation.

Sporting the intriguing title of "The Chance Taker," the "Perfect Crime" drama on "Johnny Presents" over NBC Friday at 8 p. m., will again spotlight those popular fictional characters, Inspector Ross and Step-Down Donovan, conceived by Max Marcin. Music by Johnny Green's orchestra includes "Parade of the Wooden Soldiers," "Ja Da," "All This and Heaven Too" and "There I Go." Johnny the Call Boy acts as emcee.

Tommy Thompson, Iowa's singing swing guitarist from station KRNT, Des Moines and Kitty O'Neill, the laughing lady, will be highlights of the Al Pearce program, Friday at 6:30 p. m., over the WABC network. Al Pearce and his gang will again query the audience for ideas on a new fall show. Elmer Blurt, the low-pressure salesman, will enter the song-sell-

ing market. The Merry Macs will sing "I Never Knew."

"Lovely to Look At," from Jerome Kern's "Roberta," and "Head on My Pillow" will be Frank Munn's tenor solos for Waltz Time, Friday at 8:00 p. m., over WEAf.

There will be no gun play in the NBC-Blue network's "Death Valley Days" on Friday, for the Old Ranger and his pals will be dressed in their best leather chaps to attend "Death Valley Fiesta" in celebration of their 10th anniversary on the air.

The program, one of the oldest dramatic shows on radio networks, will depart from its usual routine and present a full hour variety program over WJZ and WEAf at 7
