Mary Boland Will Trade Quips With Bazooka Bob Burns; Mystery Of "After Death" Writer On WABC

Mary Boland, the lady who has made a fortune playing scatterbrained parts on stage and screen, plus the piano team of Bartlett and Roberston, join Bob Burns and Dorothy Lamour in the Music Hall Thursday for another banner evening of entertainment.

The Music Maids and John Scott Trotter's orchestra complete the entertainment bill that lasts for 59 minutes and 10 seconds over WEAFF starting at 9 p. m.

The baffling psychic phenomenon of Patience Worth, a woman of the 17th Century who "returned after death" thru Mrs. John H. Curran of St. Louis to write some of the finest literature of our times, will be recalled on the Strange As It Seems program, Thursday over WABC at 8:30 p. m.

Strange As It Seems will reveal how Mrs. Curran first made contact with Patience Worth in 1913 while engaged in a "ouija" board session. Patience evidently had plenty to say, for she "dictated" six novels, many short stories, discourses and volumes of poetry—totalling 1,500,000 words during the next five years. Witnesses like Casper S. Yost, editor of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, were amazed at the brilliant and beautiful words that literally poured thru the lips of a woman who had no talent for writing.
