

Kate Smith Presents Radio Version Of Movie Sea Yarn

O'Neill's "The Long Voyage Home" Offered At 8 P. M. Friday Over WABC With Brian Aherne And Henry Hull In Leading Roles

Eugene O'Neill's "The Long Voyage Home," hailed by critics as one of the finest motion pictures of all time, will be presented in radio adaptation on the Kate Smith Hour over WABC Friday at 8 p. m.

Because the stars of the movie, Ian Hunter and Thomas Mitchell, are busy making other pictures, their roles will be portrayed on the air by Brian Aherne and Henry Hull, respectively. Hunter will be heard as "Smitty" and Hull as "Driscoll."

Mary Jane Walsh, blues singing star of "Too Many Girls" and other Broadway musicals, will be a guest on Alec Templeton Time Friday, at 7:30 p. m. over WEAF.

Alec as usual will be assisted by Pat O'Malley, Larry Stewart and Ray Noble's orchestra.

A public audition is the latest thing in radio and will be tried out Friday, when "Murder Will Out," a new mystery series in which a panel of celebrities attempt to solve whodunit, is put on the "Command Performance" program, via WOR to gauge listener reaction. Participating will be Margaret Burke-White, Erskine Caldwell, Homer Croy and Arthur Garfield Hayes.

The "Harry Chapman Case" will be the true story presented over WJZ Friday, at 9:00 p. m., when "Gang Busters" produces excerpts from Chapman's actual case history. Chapman, given two opportunities to "go straight," failed each time and left a trail of kidnaping and murder behind him. Finally brought down by police bullets, he was tried and sentenced to the electric chair.

Fred Waring and his staff have written another college fight song. This one, "The Gamecocks of South Carolina U.," will be dedicated to that institution on the College Smoker program Friday at 7:00 p. m., over WEAF.

The composition, by Fred and Tom Waring and Pat Ballard, is the result of a petition signed by 1,850 South Carolina students. "Danny Boy" by Weatherley,
