1 p. m., WRC—Charles Laughton, in-town for the opening of his new film, "They Knew What They Wanted," in which he costars with Carole Lombard, takes time out from his Fifteenth Street duties for a little radio recitation.

2 p. m., WMAL—Dr. Walter Damrosch begins his thirteenth consecutive season of NBC Music Appreciation Hours. As usual, the full-hour concerts will be divided into four series of half-hour programs each, to be heard on alternate weeks. Series A and B are for younger listeners, grades 4 to 8, while C and D are suitable for junior and senior high school students. However, all four may be followed with interest.

7:30, WRC—Alec Templeton continues his prickly musicizations, featuring Songstress Mary Jane Walsh.

7:30, WJSV—Attention Greensboro, N. C., citizens: Gwendolyn Farrell, lyric soprano of your home station WBIG, sings with Al Pearce and his gang.
