

World War Draft Lottery Veteran To Tell Of First

Officer Who Blindfolded Wilson Recalls Historic
Event On "We, The People;" Shirley Ross
Guest Of Bob Hope

Lieut. Col. Charles R. Morris, retired, who blindfolded President Woodrow Wilson and other officials when they plucked the numbers in the 1917-18 draft lottery, will recall that historic occasion in an interview with Gabriel Heatter on "We, The People" over WABC Tuesday at 9:00 p. m.

Other guests who will be interviewed by Heatter will include George C. Kinney, who claims that his father invented the airplane in 1878; Patricia Prochnik, band singing daughter of an ex-Minister; Lem C. Force, a one-man town government; and Mrs. Hazel Crossbeck with her daughter from whom she was separated for 12 years.

Shirley Ross, who recently returned to Hollywood after starring in several New York stage plays, will be present when Colonna acts as engineer for the wild ride.
