9, WJSV—Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy makes his first radio talk since returning from London.

9, WOL—C. Wayland Brooks talks for the Republicans.

9:30, WOL—Alfred E. Smith speaks for the Republican committee.

9:30, WJSV—Senator Robert F. Wagner, of New York.

10, WMAL—Former Representative Isabella Greenway King comes out for Mr. Willkie.
