

Many Political Broadcasts Are Set In Ohio Thursday

Pres. Roosevelt And Wilkie Both Booked For Talks; Henry Aldrich Gets Into New Scrape

Political broadcasts in Ohio will occupy a great part of ether time Thursday, a peek at the various schedules discloses.

At 3:15 p. m. Kathleen Norris will be on via WBNS and WABC. At 4:15 Pres. Roosevelt will be heard over WCOL, WHKC, WTOL, WCKY and WBNS. Martin Davey is scheduled on WTAM at 7:15 p. m. and Henry Wallace at 7:30 over WSAI, WAKR and WING.

Presidential candidate Wendell Wilkie at 8:30 will be carried by WADC, WGAR, WCKY, WCOL, WHIO and WBNS. Former Pres. Herbert Hoover and Al Smith are both booked at 9 p. m. Smith's talk will be on WKRC while Hoover may be heard over WTOL, WFMJ, WKAR, WSAI, WING and WCOL.

A Hollywood salute to Pres. Roosevelt will be carried on WKBX, WHIO, WBNS at 10 p. m.
