

# Willkie, FDR to Broadcast Monday Night

## BULLETIN

The Associated Willkie clubs announced Saturday they had engaged time of all networks from 11 p. m. to midnight Monday for an "exciting and notable broadcast." Stations were not listed.

The most complete election coverage since the first broadcast of returns in 1920 will be offered by the nation's radio stations and networks Tuesday.

Candidates and their supporters will wind up the campaigns Monday, with presidential and vice-presidential candidates of both major parties taking part in broadcasts Monday night.

Wendell L. Willkie, Republican presidential nominee; Sen. Charles L. McNary, his running mate, and Rep. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., chairman of the Republican national committee, will speak over WBBM, WCCO, and other Columbia stations at 9:15 p. m.

President Roosevelt, a well-known third term, and Henry A. Wallace, Democratic candidate for the vice-presidency, will speak during a program at 9 on WIBA, WENR, WMAQ, WTMJ, WBBM, WCCO, and other NBC and Columbia stations.

Alfred E. Smith, once a Democratic presidential nominee, and Thomas E. Dewey, whom Willkie defeated at the 1940 Republican convention, will speak in behalf of the Republican ticket. Smith will talk at 8 over WMAQ and Dewey at 7:30 over WBBM.

# There's Still Time, Hunters

How's the duck hunting been? SPOTTY!

How's the pheasant, grouse, and partridge hunting been? SPOTTY!

But cheer up, duck hunters, 29 days are left in the season and there's bound to be some shooting yet, William F. Grimmer, state game superintendent, counseled today.

Quacking for "hair in places and downright poor in others, Grimmer said, and the general season hasn't been good in Wisconsin to date because there have been no flights. Hunters are waiting for "rough" weather to bring the birds down from the far north.

Grimmer said he made checks both on Winnebago waters and the Mississippi river a few days ago, finding some birds out but "not moving a great deal."

Ruffed grouse have shown up well in the northwestern and central counties, but not so plentifully in the northeast.

Sharptail grouse and prairie chicken are unevenly distributed and there is no question there was a heavy loss of young stock last June when 4 to 8 inches of rain drowned them out in the central counties, Grimmer said.

Likewise, he said, pheasants suffered, particularly in counties containing large marshes, and neither Dane nor Dodge county has as many birds as last year, he reported. In the majority of counties, however, the supply is good.

Cover is heavier than it was last year, however, and the birds are hard to "get up," Grimmer explained. Hunters tell of flushing many unwary hens, but the cagier cocks have proved elusive.

# Former Watertown Woman Sentenced on Check Count

JEFFERSON — (U.P.) — Mrs. Gertrude Cramer, 42, formerly of Watertown, and Lester L. Averbeck, 41, Eldorado, were placed on probation Saturday after pleading guilty to passing worthless checks totaling \$40. Circuit Judge Jesse Earle sentenced each of them to terms of 1 to 3 years and then suspended sentence and ordered them to make restitution. The pair was arrested Oct. 13 at Wisconsin Rapids where Mrs. Cramer received hospital treatment for an overdose of sleeping tablets.
