

The Post Radio Time Table

6:55 a. m., WMAL—Under the auspices of the Associated Willkie Clubs, five-minute recordings of the Republican nominee's voice are heard on the two local N. B. C. stations. At 7:05 WRC airs the same disc.

7:15 p. m., WMAL—Inhabitants of Alpha Centauri, the nearest fixed star, will learn the results of an American Presidential election for the first time if they are bright enough to tune in on the networks tomorrow night. So, at least, claims Orestes H. Caldwell on his Radio Magic program.

8:30, WJSV—Thomas E. Dewey follows President Roosevelt's weekend assault on Cleveland with a talk from the Ohio city under the auspices of the National Republican Committee.

9, WMAL—Alfred E. Smith makes a final plea for the Republican nominee.

10, WMAL, WRC and WOL—President Roosevelt speaks from Hyde Park in the course of a two-hour final rally under the auspices of the National Democratic Committee. Vice Presidential candidate Henry A. Wallace also will be heard as will a complete galaxy of the President's supporters. WJSV and the C. B. S. network will join this all-inclusive hookup for the final hour at 11 o'clock.

10:15, WJSV—Wendell Willkie and the Republican high command make a penultimate appeal for three-quarters of an hour to tomorrow's voters. Senator McNary and Joseph W. Martin are also to speak.

12 MIDNIGHT, ALL STATIONS: The Republicans get the last word after the Democrats sign off the air at midnight. The G. O. P. has purchased this full hour on every sizeable station, promising "the most exciting and notable broadcast of the entire campaign, with many surprise features!"
