

# The Post Radio Time Table

10 a. m., WRC—Henry Hull makes his fourth appearance on that popular Saturday morning dramatic program, Lincoln Highway. Appropriately, his sketch is called "The Return."

10:30, WRC—Virginia Wells, who has carved a niche for herself over Harrisonburg, Virginia's, WSVA, takes to the N. B. C. network program, the National Children's Frolic.

1. WJSV—Columbia is first to pick up the Army-Navy football game at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium. WRC joins 15 minutes later. WMAL comes in at 2. Both WRC and WMAL will insert talks between 2:35 and 2:50 by the coaches of three undefeated teams. WJSV promises a news period at 2:30.

1:30, WMAL—Agile-tongued Ilka Chase flits from grand opera with Mrs. Lauritz Melchior, wife of the Metropolitan tenor, to soap opera drama with writer Elaine Sterne Carrington during luncheon at the Waldorf.

4. WJSV—The Heroes of Democracy student series salutes Benjamin Banneker, Negro mathematician and maker of the first All-American clock. The players are from Armstrong High School, while the singers are from Howard University's Glee Club.

5:30, WRC—Students of the Curtis Institute of Music offer a Beethoven Duo for Woodwinds and Mozart's Quartet in D (K. 285).

6, WJSV—New program: Report to the Nation. This is a new CBS feature, dramatizing both normal and unusual functions of the American Government as related to current news events. Aired over Coast-to-Coast network from the Wardman Park's Little Theater.

7. WJSV—"Is Labor Peace Possible?" This timely question is discussed on the People's Platform by Louis Waldman, prominent labor counsel who represents both the A. F. of L. and C. I. O.; Associate Professor Lois MacDonald, of New York University; Daniel J. Sullivan, an electrician of the A. F. of L., and Raymond C. Smith, a watch worker of the C. I. O.

8:30, WRC—That madly daft show, Truth or Consequences takes its unpredictable doings to the stage of Cleveland's Palace Theater.

9:35, WMAL—A slight indisposition keeps Arturo Toscanini from conducting the N. B. C. Symphony. Hans Wilhelm Steinberg replaces him with this program: "Tragische Overture." Brahms: Symphony No. 2 in D minor, Dvorak: Prelude and Liebstod, "Tristan und Isolde" and Overture to "Tannhauser." Wagner.

10:15, WJSV—Franklin D. Roosevelt, jr., son of the President; Miss Betsy Barton, daughter of the Republican Representative from New York and Dr. Frank Kingdon, executive director of the Citizen's Educational Service, take part in a special broadcast titled "A Roll Call of American Youth for Democracy."
