Paul Herbert's Mother Dies In Hospital

FINDLAY, Feb. 5—Funeral arrangements were incomplete today for Mrs. Laura Herbert, 79, of McComb, mother of Lt. Gov. Paul M. Herbert who died Tuesday night in Findlay hospital half an hour after her son had left for his home in Columbus.

Mrs. Herbert, widow of Dr. L. G. Herbert, retired minister and lecturer, had been brought to the hospital Monday night by her son who remained with her Tuesday and part of Tuesday evening. Herbert was informed of his mother's death upon arrival in Columbus.

She had been in failing health for two years and seriously ill two months from a heart ailment.

She was born near McComb, and except for the time she traveled with her husband, lived in that vicinity most of her life. In addition to the son, she leaves a daughter, Mrs. C. J. Wilkinson, Washington, D. C.

The funeral is expected to be held Friday afternoon at the residence in McComb with interment in the McComb mausoleum. The body is at the Barnhart funeral home here.
