# es to Recall raszthy, y Aristocrat

The story of an adventurous Hungarian aristocrat who came to Sac Prairie in 1840, opened a store, and ultimately became the most prominent figure in early Sauk county, will be told during the Wisconsin Drama series through WIBA tonight at 7:30.

The Hungarian, Agostin Haraszthy, will be played by Marcus Ford, director of this Works Projects Assn. series known as "Wisconsin—Her Men and Women."

The script was written by Keith McCutcheon, and relates how Haraszthy platted a town, operated a steamboat line and ferry, and eventually established the county seat in Baraboo and built there the county's first frame store.

In the cast, besides Ford, will be Philip Crabb, Wilfred Kastner, James Tormey, William Stephens, Orville Fish and Donald Carpenter.
