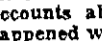

Three Experts Polls, War Over Over Round

American opinion about the war and how it is gauged will be discussed during the University of Chicago Round Table over WMAQ at 12:30 p. m. today, when three authorities talk about "The Polls and the Crisis."

Taking part will be George Gallup, director of the American Institute of Public Opinion which conducts one of the best-known polls; Harold D. Lasswell, political scientist of Washington, D. C., and William B. Benton, former advertising man and now vice-president of the University of Chicago.



An effort to sift the truth from scores of conflicting eyewitness accounts about what actually happened when President Abraham Lincoln went to Gettysburg battlefield to deliver his famous address will be made on the Hidden History program over WENR at noon today.

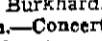

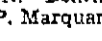

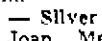
