Bergen Awarded MA Degree



BERGEN AND MCCARTHY

EVANSTON, Ill.—(U.P.)—Northwestern university, at its 83rd annual commencement exercises, Saturday awarded an Honorary Master of Arts degree to one of her sons who has achieved fame for infusing personality into a wooden dummy.

In bestowing the honor upon Edgar Bergen, Pres. Franklyn Bliss Snyder cited the ventriloquist-manipulator of Charlie McCarthy as one "who, through the combination of mind, imagination and skill has given many millions of moments of forgetfulness of pain and trouble, fresh laughter and hours of delight; who has despite his fame remained an humble man, grateful for his success."

Bergen hoped his scholastic honor would enable him to cope better with McCarthy, who has been inclined to throw his intellectual weight about since Northwestern's school of speech made him a "master of innuendo" two years ago.

He related the following conversation with Charlie which he vowed occurred before he parted with the dummy for his trip east.

Bergen: "Education to the man is like the sculptor to the marble block."

Charlie: "It sure made a bust out of you."
