Newspapermen Will Pit Wits Against Radio Editors For Initial Program Via WEAF
At 8 P. M.

Besides Al Goodman's orchestra, talent for the first show will include singing Barry Wood, Soprano Grace Moore, Mickey Rooney, Judy Garland, Charles Laughton and Clifton Fadiman, Oscar Levant, John Kieran and F. P. Adams of Information Please.

microphone for the very first time over WLW on Wednesday, at 7 p. m., in the first of a new and original series of half-hour mystery-and-comedy dramas, "Adventures of the Thin Man."
