

Hedy Lamarr Will Appear On Radio Theatre's Final Show

John Kirby's Swingsters To Be Heard Monday Evening; Mystery Drama Is Scheduled For Airing

Cecil B. DeMille is one who believes in ending his Radio Theatre's season with a flourish. He's now added Hedy LaMarr, the gorgeous movie actress, to the cast of "Algiers" which will be presented with Charles Boyer as Pepe LeMoko at 8 p. m. Monday over WABC.

"Algiers" was a star-making motion-picture, for it uncovered Hedy LaMarr as a young lady guaranteed to make any audience gasp with amazement at her perfect beauty. That Miss LaMarr could act as well as decorate a screen was also revealed to those who saw the movie.

Now the combination of Charles Boyer and Hedy LaMarr becomes a reality on the radio for the first time. It is a fitting climax to the most successful season ever enjoyed by the Radio Theatre. The full-hour dramatic show will resume its policy of presenting stellar Hollywood names in the productions listeners want to hear on Sept. 8.

The studio air-conditioning can positively be expected to break down Monday night at 8 p. m. when John Kirby and his band, sizzlingest of swingsters, are the guests of the irrepressible "Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street" over WJZ.

No four studio walls have ever been exposed to the heat which will be generated by Kirby's famous swing combination in conjunction with the Basin Street denizens. The latter include such well known and musically notorious characters as Maestro Paul Laval and his Gusty Ten; "Dr." Henry (Hot Lips) Levine and his Spasmodic Eight; "Dr." Gino Hamilton, who dishes out the footnotes, and Wil S. Scott, Intermission interceder.

"Contrasts," a modern love song written by Maestro Percy Faith, will have its network debut on the "Carnation Contented" program, Monday at 9 p. m., over WEAf. William Miller, guest tenor, will sing the number.

Erich Korngold's seldom-sung "Pierrot's Dance Song" will be featured by Margaret Speaks on the Voice of Firestone program, Monday at 7:30 p. m., EDST, over the NBC-Red Network. Miss Speaks' other soprano solos will be "Hark, Hark, the Lark" by Schubert, "None But the Lonely Heart" by Tschaiowsky, and "Voi Lo Sapete" from "Cavalleria Rusticana" by Mascagni.

A medley from Johann Strauss' sparkling operetta, "Die Fledermaus," featuring Francia White, soprano, the chorus and symphonic orchestra, will highlight the "Telephone Hour," Monday at 7 p. m. over WEAf.
