

Maggie And Jiggs Of Comic Page Family To Be On Air

Gov. Stassen To Be Heard In Acceptance Of Service Award; Soda Jerkers Meet Cosmeticians

Maggie and Jiggs, that loveable couple whose domestic tribulations have been a comic page riot and standard family amusement for almost 40 years, are on the air.

The domineering Maggie and the long-suffering Jiggs make their radio debut Tuesday night, from 8:00 to 8:30 p. m., over a coast-to-coast hookup in the spot hitherto occupied by "Grand Central Station."

"Bringing Up Father," the title of the comic strip in which Maggie and Jiggs have appeared continuously since 1912, is a presentation of Lever Brothers for its product, Rinso. Maggie, Jiggs and others in the comic strip drawn by George McManus will be portrayed by an all-star cast.

Maggie and Jiggs are known to newspaper readers in every country in the world where newspapers are published. The "Bringing Up Father" comic supplement is the only one in the world to claim the distinction of having such an extensive publication.
