

U. S. Foreign Leads Air Di During Week

American relations with Russia will be discussed in two broadcasts tonight. Speaking over WBBM at 8:15, Rep. Fred C. Smith (R., Ohio) will oppose United States aid to the Soviets.

At 9, two labor leaders and two labor editors will examine American foreign policy, with particular reference to Russia, for WBBM listeners. They will be Thomas J.
