At 8 P. M. Wednesday

Benay Venuta, blonde singing star of stage and radio, will add a new accomplishment to her crowded career this summer, officiating as Budd Hulick's "co-captain" on the weekly "Quizzer Baseball" broadcast on WEAJ Wednesdays at 8 00 p. m.
