Wendell L. Wilkie, outspoken crusader for American aid to Great Britain, will speak from San Francisco at 11:15 over WBBM.

He will discuss the American position in the world crisis.

Under the title "Silent Wings," a WGN broadcast at 6:30 will bring a description of a glider plant at Joliet, Ill. The place of manufacturing in the defense scheme will be presented in dramatic form over WBBM at 6:30 in "Midwest Mobilizes." The program, postponed from last week, will include visits to factories where airplane heaters, machine tools, gun carriages, tanks, and guns are made.
