## SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE AT NAVY YARD IMMINENT

NEW YORK, Aug. 1—(INS)—Settlement of the strike of AFL electric workers at the Brooklyn Navy Yard and on other vital defense construction appeared imminent today following intervention of Sidney Hillman, co-director of the Office of Production Management in Washington.

Officials of Local 3, International Brotherhood of Electric Workers, called a meeting for this morning of the union's executive committee and the sub-committee in charge of the strike to consider a back-to-work plan in accordance with Hillman's request. Hillman's plea came after Harry Van Arsdale, Jr., business manager of the union, had conferred in Washington with Eli Oliver, OPM chief labor adviser and other officials.

The strike of 8,000 union electricians began Tuesday and followed a dispute with the Consolidated Edison system of New York over the installation of equipment at the firm's Waterside plant in Manhattan.

It was indicated, however, that settlement of the strike in the Navy yard and on other defense projects will not affect the walk-out on hundreds of non-defense projects thruout New York City.
