

Simone Simon To Be Guest On Stern's Sports Program

Pert French Comedienne One Of Best Amateur
Tennis Players In Film Colony; Once
Played With Tilden

Simone Simon, whose skill at tennis is exceeded only by her cinematic pulchritude, will be the guest of Bill Stern on his "Sports Newsreel of the Air" program over WJZ Sunday at 8:45 p. m.

The pert little French comedienne, whose latest starring picture, "The Devil and Daniel Webster" has just been released, is one of the best racqueteers in Hollywood. Last year she and Bill Tilden played an extended exhibition tour against Donald Budge and Carole Lombard.

The all-girl "Hour of Charm" orchestra, which has entertained soldiers and sailors with their Sunday night broadcast, will put on a show for the Marines, Sunday, at 9 p. m. over WFAF. The broadcast will originate at Marine Base, Quantico Hills, Va.

George Wald will demonstrate his vocal ability and lead his orchestra aboard the "Fitch Summer Bandwagon" on Sunday, at 6:30 p. m., over WFAF.

A former University of Southern California varsity football player, Wald began singing professionally after winning a contest at the Coconut Grove in Hollywood. He was featured vocalist with several orchestras before he organized his own band. He emphasizes versatility and his band's repertoire ranges from waltzes to tangos.

William Shakespeare gets tangled up with "The Parker Family" on Sunday at 8:15 p. m., over WJZ, and this time the bard emerges second best.

The title of this episode of adolescent turmoil in the life of young Richard Parker is entitled "The Play's the Thing" or "You Never Can Tell How Shakespeare Will Turn Out."
