

Race Driver Wilbur Shaw To Be On The Air Monday Night

Three Time Winner Of Indianapolis Class^t Will Tell Real Meaning Of The Approaching Soap Box Derby In Akron

Wilbur Shaw, famous automobile racer, will be interviewed on the real meaning of the approaching National Soap Box Derby finals in Akron, of which he is to be official referee, during the broadcast over WEAF Monday, at 7:30 p. m. Hugh James, the program's announcer, will con-

wheel in the 1911 race and was forced out at 380 miles when he was leading the field. He won the race in 1937, 1939 and 1940, and is the only man to have won two consecutive races. He is general sales manager of the Firestone Aviation Corp. of which Leonard K. Firestone, is president.
