

# ey Days to Te ory Tonight

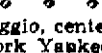
A "thriller" which had its climax in Madison will be dramatized in Death Valley Days over WLS at 8:30 tonight.

The story's hero was H. McFarlane, a daring Wells Fargo express messenger. He was guarding the Minneapolis-Chicago run back in 1888 when he was warned to beware of a gang of desperadoes who might be after a valuable shipment on his train.

At Baldwin, Wis., a coffin was put aboard along with several crates of berries and fruit. The coffin was properly addressed to Chicago and the usual death certificate was attached. 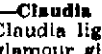

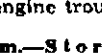

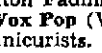
