Broadcast to Salute Queen Wilhelmina

Radio will salute Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands in a special broadcast over NBC-WMAQ at 10 a. m. today. The program will link New York, Batavia, London, and Ottawa, and will include a dramatization, a discussion of the Dutch government's position, birthday greetings, and music.

Participants will include Pierre Van Paassen, Clifton Fadiman, the governor general of the Netherlands East Indies, the Dutch prime minister, Princess Juliana, a Dutch private soldier, the National Symphony orchestra, and a Dutch chorus.

President Roosevelt will head a list of speakers saluting Labor day on the air Monday. The president will speak during a program presented by the Office of Emergency Management over an NBC network. The broadcast will be carried by WIBA from 11 to 11:15 a. m. and from 11:30 a. m. to 12 m., and by WMAQ and WLS from 11 a. m. to noon.

Besides the president, participants will be Ernest Bevin, British minister of labor; Sidney Hillman, associate director of the Office of Production Management; William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor; James Carey, executive secretary of the Congress of Industrial Organizations; Duke Ellington's orchestra; the Golden Gate quartet; Lowell Thomas, radio commentator; Melvyn Douglas, James Cagney, and Edward Arnold, of the movies; the U. S. Marine band; Barry Wood, singer, and the chorus of the International Ladies Garment Workers union.

Green will speak again at 2 p. m. over WENR, and Allan Haywood, of the CIO, will talk at 3 over WIBA. Gov. Dwight H. Green will give a Labor day address at 2:45 over WBBM.

Another special program will be a pageant, "These, Our Freedoms," in which 500 persons representing 42 nationalities will participate. It will be broadcast from Weirton, W. Va., over WMAQ at 7:30 p. m.
