

Stalin's Life Tops Radio Today in 'These Four Men' Series

Joseph Dzhugashvili, otherwise known as Josef Stalin, premier of the Soviet Union, general secretary of the Russian Communist party's central committee, and people's commissar for national affairs, will be the second world leader to have his life dramatized in the "These Four Men" series over WMAQ tonight at 5. Ralph Morgan will enact the leading role. The biography will tell how Stalin, Lenin, and a group of 10 other men organized the revolution which overthrew the Kerensky government and will carry the story to the present, as the premier sits in the Kremlin at Moscow and directs Russia's defense against the Nazi invasion.
