

Gripping Story Of Heroic Aid To Indians To Be Told

How United States Airforce Circled Above Snow-Bound Red Men In Arizona To Drop Food Will Be Heard Friday

How the United States airforce encircled the Eleventh Bombardment Squadron and saved the lives of 19,000 Navajo Indians is the story to be told on the "Wings of Destiny" program Friday at 9 p. m. over WEAJ.

Operating from Riverside, Calif., under command of Lt. Charles H. Howard, six Curtis bombers of the Eleventh Bombardment Squadron left March Field, Riverside, and flew to Winslow, Ariz., where in cooperation with the Southern Navajo Agency the Squadron flew more than 15,000 miles, dropping food to snow bound Indians. The flight was Jan. 17 to 22 in 1931, one of the most severe winters ever experienced in that section.

"Angels With Dirty Faces," a story which starred James Cagney on the screen, will be recreated for radio on Charles Martin's "Playhouse" over WABC Friday at 8 p. m. The action centers around two people, one who becomes a priest, the other a gangster, and their respective careers. Sylvia Sidney has been cast as the feminine lead.
