Morris Himmelstein Inherits Cash From Father He Hasn't Seen Or Heard From But Once In Last 17 Years

Morris Himmelstein, an employe in a New York City die-cutting factory, and the sole support of his mother, Mrs. Marcus Himmelstein, will tell the Are You A Missing Heir audience on Tuesday at 7:00 p. m. over WABC how it feels to inherit a \$13,000 fortune from a father that Morris, now 27 years old, hadn't seen or heard from but once in the last 17 years.

A girl working in Morris's place of employment, heard the Heirs broadcast on Sept. 9 naming Morris and his mother as heirs and suggested Morris get in touch with the Missing Heirs program. The suggestion was worth \$13,000 to the missing legatee.
