

Lum And Abner Will Open Four Time A Week Broadcast

Contented Hour Marks 500th Broadcast On Monday Evening; Popular Pieces Will Feature Spot

"Lum and Abner," argumentative Arkansas storekeepers, will be busy men when they open their fall season of broadcasts on Monday starting four-times-a-week schedule of shows.

First of the three four-times-a-weekly broadcasts will be heard over WJZ from 6:30 to 6:45 p. m. for eastern listeners. At 10:30 p. m. there will be a repeat show over WJZ for listeners in the central states.

Two hundred and fifty hours or 10½ solid days of broadcasting spread over almost a decade will be rounded out by the "Carnation Contented" program, Monday when the 500th broadcast in the long series is heard at 10 p. m. over WEAF.

In honor of the occasion, Maestro Percy Faith and his cast will salute their listeners with some of the music which has been most popular during the history of the program, and E. H. Stuart, president of the company which has sponsored the program since its inception on Jan. 4, 1932, will speak.

From a piano finger exercise Adolf Jensen developed the lovely melody of "Murmuring Zephyrs" which James Melton, tenor, will feature on the "Telephone Hour," Monday at 8 p. m. over WEAF. He will also sing the traditional cowboy tune, "The Old Chisholm Trail."

Judith Anderson and Burgess Meredith, stars of radio, stage and screen, will divide honors as guest star and commentator, respectively, on the second of "Cavalcade of America's" two part series, "Native Land."

The broadcast, to be developed to the part played by women in creating the democratic institutions of the United States, is to be heard over WEAF Monday at 7:30 p. m.

As a parting gesture to the season, Margaret Speaks will sing "The Last Rose of Summer," by Moore, as her first selection on the "Voice of Firestone" program, Monday, at 8:30 p. m. over WEAF. The popular soprano also

will be heard in Keller's "American Hymn" and "Voices of Spring" by Strauss.

Myrna Loy and William Powell, one of the most popular romantic teams of the films and remembered for brilliant performances in previous Radio Theatre offerings, will head an all-star cast in Cecil B. DeMille's Radio Theatre adaptation of the movie "Third Finger, Left Hand" airing Monday, at 9 p. m. over WABC.
