TRAFFIC FLOWS ON MISSISSIPPI TO NEW RECORD

BURLINGTON, Ia., Oct. 24 — (UP)—Prosperity note: The volume of traffic tonnage on the upper Mississippi river is setting new records this year.

The total for the season, up to Oct. 1, was 1,973,378 tons, compared with 1,510,776 for the same period of 1940. The increasing importance of the Mississippi in commerce is apparent in the fact that the gain of 462,602 tons is greater than the entire tonnage for a full season a few years ago.

Col. Clinton W. Ball, district engineer, estimates that the total tonnage for 1941 will approximate 2,500,000 tons.

September traffic on the river set a new record, with 555,068 tons, compared with 522,167 tons in September, 1940.

The major part of the shipments upstream is coal and petroleum, while traffic downstream largely is grain.
