TWO WILLS ARE PROBATED IN AUGLAIZE-CO

WAPAKONETA, Oct. 28 Two wills were admitted to record Monday in Auglaize co probate court at hearings held before Judge Harry F. Wittenbrink.

The estate of Earl S. Kauffman, prominent Uniopolis resident, who died two weeks ago, was bequeathed to his wife, Carrie, who also was named executor without bond. A. L. McMurray, Milton Yoder and Walter Smith were appointed appraisers. The will was dated Feb. 24, 1922, and was witnessed by E. D. Lusk and Ruth DuBois.

The largest part of the estate of Charles E. Meekstroth, a New Knoxville physician for more than 25 years, who died a week ago, was bequeathed to his wife, Martha, who also was named executor without bond.

She is to receive the property located in New Knoxville, all personal property and one half of the income of real estate located in Shelby-co. In case of her remarriage or death, all real estate is to go to four surviving children, who were bequeathed the other half of the Shelby-co property.

H. E. Beery and Sarabell Ringlespauch, both of Sidney, witnessed the will, which was dated Dec. 5, 1939.
