Good Listening: Music

December is a musical festival, tra-la-la, with Christmas music taking its dignified place, with opera also in season (Metropolitan, Saturday 1 p. m., WIBA, WMAQ; Chicago opera, Monday, 10 p. m., WGN), and with symphonies the meat of the feast.

This year Madison hears without interruption the NBC orchestra, Tuesdays 8:30-9:30, WENR. Music lovers have refused dinner invitations rather than miss a concert by this orchestra. It is the first full-sized orchestra to be formed in this country by a broadcasting company. It ranks with the best. It is four years old, a mere infant compared with others often heard on the air: with the 41-year old Philadelphia orchestra, for example, or with the century-old New York Philharmonic (2:00 - 3:30 Sundays, WBBM).

Curious how different the same symphony, played by the same orchestra, can sound! Not so curious, either, come to think of it. Two musicians playing the same selection on the same piano produce quite different effects; two conductors bring as different qualities to the performance of the same symphony and the same orchestra.

The best conductors obtainable have led the NBC orchestra. This year ill health keeps Toscanini from taking charge of it. But another distinguished conductor, Leopold Stokowski of the Philadelphia orchestra has directed the November concerts; later he will conduct another series of four on March 24, 31, April 7, 14. During November the popularity of the NBC orchestra and of Stokowski has been so great the NBC studio 8H in New York, the largest broadcasting studio in the world, (17 seats 1,500), was too small to accommodate the would-be audience. As a result, NBC rented a larger auditorium and charged admission to defray the expenses—the first such development in radio history. And still some people think the public will listen to nothing but trash!

Daytime Music

And speaking a trifle, daytime programs in this section are at least as trashy as they were last year. Where are the symphony orchestras and the string ensembles for daytime listeners? And the bands? Everybody likes a band. Marine band! Army band! Navy band! If we listeners want such daytime programs we must tell our stations so. If we don't, they can only guess, and they may not guess right.

To daytime listeners who wish they knew where to turn for good music we submit a short list. A similar list published last fall we found near people's radios months later. Thus encouraged—!
