

# Irving Berlin Songs To Be Heard On Kostelanetz Hour

Kenny Baker Will Sing Several Old Favorites; "Inner Sanctum Mystery" Has Real Thriller-Chiller On Tap

Songs of Irving Berlin are spotlighted on the Andre Kostelanetz program Sunday, at 4:30 p. m., over WABC with Kenny Baker as guest soloist.

Numbers are "Say It With Music," "Remember," "Blue Skies" and "A Pretty Girl is Like a Melody." The orchestra will also be heard in "One Night of Love" and "Orange Blossom Lane." Albert Spalding, violinist, is master of ceremonies.

"Death Has Claws," the "Inner Sanctum Mystery" chiller scheduled to be broadcast on Sunday, at 8:30 p. m., over WJR is a terror-building story based on one man's psychopathic love of cats. His tortured mind drives him to murder, literally, at the slightest disparaging remark about his pets. Altho no one knows how bad he really is, he is feared and distrusted.

The climax of the story comes when he is left to take care of a child one evening and the baby pulls the tail of the cat, making it squeal. He rushes in from another room, arms raised to kill the child, when . . . the surprise ending comes.
