# Raymond On Radio

Famous Singer And Mate Will Be DeMille During Broadcast Series For 9 P. M. Monday Via WEAF

Cecil B. DeMille will present Jeanette MacDonald, her husband, for the first time in the Radio theatre's adaptation of their recent film, "Smilin' Through" Monday at 9:00 p. m. on WEAF. Aherne will complete the triumvirate of stars in the same role he had in the film.

Richard Crooks, whose seasonal return to the Metropolitan Opera in Mozart's "Don Giovanni" last week brought cheers from New York critics, will feature an aria from Mendelssohn's oratorio, "The Elijah", on the "Voice of Firestone" concert, Monday at 8:30 p. m. over WEAF.

In addition to the Mendelssohn aria, "If With All Your Hearts", Crooks will be heard in "Lindy Lou" by Strickland, "Tell Me That You Love Me Tonight", and Foster's "Come Where My Love Lies Dreaming".

"Appointment For Murder," the "Inner Sanctum Mystery" to be heard Monday, on WJZ at 8:30 p. m. is a deep psychological study of revenge. The story revolves about two men, one, innocent of any misdeed, is sent to prison for a crime committed by the other man. When he is finally released from jail, the ex-convict searches down the real criminal to get his revenge. His methods are fiendishly ingenious, for he murders the offender by suggestion; first sending him a coffin, then letters from a mortician. The finale of the story, when the villain of the piece dies as the result of his fear and guilt, will give dialers the shivers for fair, we are promised by Director Ulman Brown and Host Raymond Edward Johnson.

A musical salvo to Rudolph Friml will be a special feature of the "Telephone Hour," Monday, with James Melton singing the composer's "Donkey Serenade" with Chorus, and Francis White offering "Aladdin's Holiday" from "Kalinka" as her soprano solo at 8:00 p. m. over WEAF.

Ten years of musical service is the record of the "Carnation Contented" program which will hold a double celebration Monday, commemorating its own anniversary and that of the New Year at 10:00 p. m. over WEAF.

Maxwell Anderson's "Valley Forge" has proved tremendously popular on the air. It was first broadcast by the "Great Plays"

series in "A Christmas in America" rebroadcast as a holiday special. The sponsor was a radio station. This story of a simple and heroic life was again by "The Voice of Firestone" Monday at 7:30 p. m. with Lionel Atwill in the title role of George Washington.
