Dickens' Powerful Story Of French Revolution Set For Radio Theatre Via WABC At 9 P. M. On Monday

A full-hour dramatization of "The Tale of Two Cities," Charles Dickens' powerful story of love and hate during the French revolution, will be the Radio Theatre's presentation for Monday, Jan. 12, with Ronald Colman and Edna Best starred. The program is scheduled for 9 p. m. over WABC.

A musical salvo to W. S. Gilbert and Sir Arthur Sullivan, whose works reached such popularity during their lifetime that London clubs began to fine members for quoting their words or music, will be presented by orchestra, soloists and chorus under Maestro Percy Faith, on the Contented program, Monday at 10:00 over WEAJ.

Presentations will include selections from "Iolanthe," "The Pirates of Penzance" and "Pinafore," as well as other works written by Sullivan without benefit of Gilbert's texts.

Wilfred Pelletier of the Metropolitan Opera will take over the "Voice of Firestone" podium for the second successive week in the absence of Alfred Wallenstein, Monday at 8:30 p. m. over WEAJ when the program features a septet of popular request numbers with Richard Crooks as soloist.

Crooks will sing "Song of India" by Rimsky-Korsakoff, Balfe's "Killarney," the Negro spiritual, "Were You There?" and "Ah, May the Red Rose" by Stephen Foster.

A favorite of movie and radio audiences alike, winsome little Janet Gaynor, one of the Hollywood colony's most popular members, will put in her initial appearance as guest star on Herbert Marshall's new program at 7:00 p. m.
