

Gary Cooper Will Be Heard In "Sergeant York" Sunday

Screen Star To Receive Redbook Award For Best
Performance Of The Year During
7:30 P. M. Broadcast

Gary Cooper will receive the annual Redbook Magazine Award for the best performance of 1941 in recognition of his work in the film, "Sergeant York," and will star in the first radio adaptation of the screen success with Joan Leslie and Walter Brennan as his co-stars, on the "Screen Guild Theatre" broadcast over WABC Sunday at 7:30 p. m.

Following a two-week vacation at Palm Springs and a broadcast from March Field, Jack Benny returns to Hollywood for his WEAf program Sunday, at 7 p. m., brimming with plans for a radio version of Errol Flynn's current screen epic, "They Died With Their Boots On."

When the "sweetheart of Wheeling Steel", Sarah Rehm Rogers, returns to the program as headliner after a three years absence, the Musical Steelmakers will see that the rafters of the Capitol theatre ring with their welcome during the broadcast Sunday at 5:30 p. m. over WEAf.

In special tribute to Central and South America, maestro Tommy Whitley and the orchestra will offer a Latin Medley of "Cielito Lindo," "Aye-Aye-Aye," and "El Rancho Grande." Whitley, following up with music with a memory, will lead the orchestra in "Moonlight and Roses," "Blue Skies," and a real swingeroo, a Glenn Miller arrangement of the "Volga Boat Song."

Dapper Charles Kong, one of the greatest male musical comedy stars of the century, will headline "Those Good Old Days" over WEAf Sunday, at 8:30 p. m. Starting in the chorus of "The Yankee Prince" in 1908, he went on to stardom in such hits as "Hit the Deck," "Little Nellie Kelly," in which he sang to George M. Cohan songs that became sensations, and others. From

there he went into the movies and sang "The Broadway Melody." "Singing in the Rain" was a feature in the movie that catapulted King to celluloid stardom. On the radio program, he will sing a collection of these hits which he made famous.

Another ad lib comicquiz show featuring Bob Hawk with Vaughn Monroe's orchestra playing "Tom Thumb" and "Day Dreaming," will be presented on the half hour "How Am I Doin'" program Friday at 7:30 p. m. over WABC. Monroe's vocal number will be "Shrine of St. Cecilia."

While Gildersleeve's niece, Marjorie Forrester, is away at the Red Cross Training School, Giddy and his nephew, LeRoy, undertake to redecorate her room with frightening results on the Great Gildersleeve program Sunday, at 6:30 p. m. over WEAf.
