

Cary Grant To Portray New Type Role Monday Evening

Cinema Star Will Be Heard In Radio Adaptation Of "Here Comes Mr. Jordan;" Operatic Favorite Will Sing Popular Numbers

The search of the ghost of a young prizefighter, untimely snatched from the land of the living, for a new body for his regeneration is the subject of "Here Comes Mr. Jordan," the successful film which will be presented in a special adaptation by Cecil B. DeMille on the Radio Theatre, Monday with Cary Grant in the role of the pugilist, Joe Pendleton. The program will be aired at 9 p. m. over WABC.

Concluding concerts from the cinema capital Margaret Speaks, soprano, will be heard in a program of predominantly light music, Monday on WEAF at 8:30 p. m. Alfred Wallenstein will conduct.

Miss Speaks will sing "One Night Of Love," by Schertzingler, "A House Made For You and Me," by Contes, "You Are Free," from Kreisler's "Apple Blossoms," and "Voi lo Sapete" from Mascagni's "Cavalleria Rusticana." Orchestral selections are to be Lacombe's "La Feria," Jarnefeldt's "Praeludium" and "Vienna Beauties" Waltz by Zieherer.

An international concert featuring music by the French composer Saint-Saens, the Italian Rossini, the English Sir Arthur Sullivan, the Russian Prokofieff and America's own Jerome Kern is to be presented by a cast of 83 artists during the "Telephone Hour," Monday at 8 p. m. over WEAF.

Tenor James Melton's solos will be "Gwine to Hebb'n," by Wolfe and Seaver's "Just For Today," while Francia White's soprano aria is "The Swan" by Saint-Saens. They will join voices in "The Touch of Your Hand," from Kern's "Roberta."

Madeleine Carroll's lucky number, 26, turns up again in the career of the beautiful screen actress as she returns to the "Cavalcade of America" Monday, to be starred in a radio adaptation of Philip Barry's famous play, "To-

morrow and Tomorrow," at 7:30 p. m. over WEAF.

Tom Sawyer, the Connecticut Yankee, Huck Finn and Indian Joe will live again when a musical portrait of Mark Twain is painted on the "Carnation Contented" program Monday under the direction of Conductor-Composer Percy Faith at 10 p. m. over WEAF.

Orchestra presentations typifying on the Mississippi during Clemens' time will be "Mardi Gras," "The Harmonica Player" and "De Old Ark's A-Moverin'." Tenor William Miller will sing "Ah—Moon of My Delight" and Reinhold Schmidt, "Old Man River." The Carnation Chorus is to present "Old Missouri" and Lullaby Lady Evelyn Ames will sing "Mighty Lak a Rose."

Followers of the new variety show featuring Herbert Marshall will be treated to the rare event of two performances in one week when the program is aired both on Jan. 26 and Jan. 30. On that week the show moves from its old spot at 7 p. m. Monday nights to a new position in the kilocycle cavalcade on Friday nights at 8 p. m. over WJZ.
