PROPAGANDA OF AXIS DEFEATED BY DISINTEREST

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 — (INS) — The American people were credited by FCC Chairman James Lawrence Fly with smashing Axis-Japanese short-wave radio propaganda overtures "of amazing proportions" by the simplest of weapons—their "complete, willful disinterest."

American disinclination to listen to the old, notorious devices of exaggeration, suppression, distortion, appeals to vanity, pride, self-interest and exploitation, Fly declared, have turned the enemy's "ether war" into a "wholesale fiasco."
