

Inventor Of Garand Rifle Will Broadcast On Tuesday

Firearms Expert To Be Guest On "We, The People" At 9 P. M.; Bob Hope Show Set At Artillery Camp

John Garand, inventor of the famous army rifle bearing his name, will tell how he developed the semi-automatic gun, which General MacArthur praised in a recent letter to Washington, when Garand is Eddie Dowling's guest on "We, the People," Tuesday, over WABC at 9 p. m.

Another guest, Captain Raabe, will describe his experiences as a pirate during the 1870's. One of the greatest adventures in which the Captain participated was an attempt to shanghai Jack London.

C. Aubrey Smith, actor, who has been in the profession for 50 years, will also be on the program.

Bob Hope will add artillery reinforcements to his army of occupation when he takes over Camp Cook, giant new army camp near Lompoc, Calif., Tuesday at 10:00 p. m. over WEAF.
